MDPIM International Equity Pool

Management Report of Fund Performance (December 31, 2025)

Investment Objectives and Strategies

The MDPIM International Equity Pool (the "Fund") seeks to achieve long-term growth of capital by investing in a diversified portfolio of global equity securities.

The Fund employs a multi-manager approach which seeks to deliver excess returns compared to the benchmark and to provide diversification by avoiding overconcentration in any single style, sector or market trend. Fund assets are allocated to a combination of the investment advisers for the Fund, based on the Manager's assessment of the investment advisers' skills, the predicted capital market environment, and the anticipated risk inherent in each investment adviser's strategy.

The Fund may not invest in companies that manufacture tobacco or tobacco-related products or cannabis or cannabis related products.

Risk

At times, a portfolio can be subject to any number of investment risks. The risk level of the Fund did not change significantly during the year. Descriptions of the investment risks associated with this Fund are detailed in the Simplified Prospectus.

Results of Operations

For the period ended December 31, 2025, the Fund had a total return of 20.1% (Series A).

International equities advanced over the 12-month period as the MSCI EAFE Index (C\$) returned 25.7%. The first half 2025 witnessed President Trump introduce tariffs to the world and saw investors shift their focus and assets to international markets as U.S. equities whipsawed from positive to negative back to positive territory.

President Trump did eventually dial back the tariffs from his initial proposal and the economic fears proved unfounded and central banks were able to continue normalizing interest rates. As concerns faded, investors shifted gears into a risk on sentiment in the second half.

In the third quarter, the U.S. economy expanded at an annual rate of 4.3%, the highest growth rate in two years. Despite a resilient economy with strong GDP growth, the labor market struggled as the unemployment rate inched up to 4.4%, leading the U.S. Federal Reserve (Fed) to cut interest rates three times over the period from 4.50% to 3.75%, which is now at a three-year low.

In the Eurozone, investor confidence was bolstered by the Fed rate cuts and the European Central Bank (ECB) rate cuts. The ECB cut rates four times in the first half and none in the second half. This helped ease global financial conditions and reduce risks for European assets. Economic conditions across the eurozone remained mixed. Manufacturing activity, especially in Germany, continued to contract and that negatively affected export-focused sectors. Services activity stayed strong, however, and that helped overall business activity expand modestly.

In Asia Pacific, Japan saw moderate growth in 2025, although there was a notable deceleration in the second half of the year. Inflation pressures and rising real wages led the Bank of Japan to raise interest rates to levels not seen in Japan in decades, although still low by global standards. Australia saw growth reaccelerate from near stall speed and inflation eased allowing the RBA to ease monetary policy. Precious metals were the standout asset class for the period. Gold dominated the headlines as international central banks continued to diversify their reserve holdings into the precious metal, benefiting Australia. While emerging markets were very strong, particularly Korea and Taiwan who benefited from the AI and data center investments.

Foreign currency was a net positive contributor to return due to strength in international currencies relative to the Canadian dollar. In particular, European currencies such as the euro, Swiss franc and pound sterling were the biggest positive contributors, but Scandinavian and Latin American currency exposure was also positive.

The Fund's regional allocations were split between Europe and Asia-Pacific. European equities, including the UK, represented the largest allocation, more than 60% the portfolio by market value, on average. European equities were the largest positive contributors to return given strong returns and their dominant weight in the portfolio, however, emerging markets and Asia-Pacific were also quite strong. Japan was the weakest performing major market in the portfolio but still experienced returns which were solidly positive.

All of the 11 sectors represented in the portfolio contributed positively to the Fund's return in Canadian dollar terms. Financials, Industrials and Information Technology were the biggest positive contributors to return due to their large weight and strong returns. Real Estate had the smallest contribution to return due to its small weight.

The Fund's active multi-manager structure combines complementary investment approaches. The fund is actively managed with positions changing based on relative opportunities, however, there were no material changes to the sector or country positioning of the Fund over the period.

As at December 31, 2025, the total net asset value of the Fund was \$5.38 billion, an increase of 15% since the beginning of the year. The increase is due to net investment gain and net contributions, offset by income distributions to unitholders.

Recent Developments

STRATEGIC CHANGES

There have been no strategic changes and the Fund continues to be managed in a manner consistent with its investment mandate and is positioned to achieve its long-term objectives. The Investment Advisers have adhered to their investment disciplines and portfolio strategies.

Related Party Transactions

MD Financial Management Inc. is the Manager, Registrar and Trustee of the Fund. As Manager, MD Financial Management Inc. manages the overall business of the MD Family of Funds and the MDPIM Pools (collectively "the Funds") and is responsible for: setting investment objectives, providing and/or retaining the services of third party service providers for fund accounting services, administration services, and promoting the sales of the Fund's units.

The Manager is a wholly-owned subsidiary of The Bank of Nova Scotia (Scotiabank).

1832 Asset Management LP, a subsidiary of Scotiabank, is the portfolio manager of the Funds. MD Financial Management Inc., as Manager, continues to have overall responsibility for the management of the Funds. MD Financial Management Inc. is the registered portfolio manager and provides the discretionary portfolio management services to managed-account clients through MD Private Investment Counsel. 1832 Asset Management LP is responsible for the overall performance of the Funds, the management of fund assets and the selection and monitoring of the Funds' sub-advisors.

The Manager, on behalf of the Fund, may enter into transactions or arrangements with other members of Scotiabank or certain other companies that are related or connected to the Manager (each a "related party"). All transactions between the Fund and the related parties are in the normal course of business and are carried out at arm's length terms.

MDPIM International Equity Pool

As Registrar, MD Financial Management Inc. keeps track of the owners of units of the MDPIM Pools, processes purchase, transfer and redemption orders, issues investor account statements, and issues annual tax reporting information.

As the Fund is organized as a Trust, investing in the Fund means purchasing units of the Trust. As Trustee to the Fund, MD Financial Management Inc. holds actual title to the property in the Fund – the cash and securities the Fund invests in – on behalf of the unitholders.

Units of the MDPIM Pools are only available to clients of MD Private Trust Company or discretionary managed account clients of MD Financial Management Inc. MD Management Limited ceased to be the principal distributor of the MDPIM Pools as effective October 29, 2018.

INDEPENDENT REVIEW COMMITTEE

The Manager has established an independent review committee (the “IRC”) in accordance with National Instrument 81-107 – Independent Review Committee for Investment Funds (“NI 81-107”) with a mandate to review and provide recommendations or approval, as required, on conflict of interest matters referred to it by the Manager on behalf of the Fund. The IRC is responsible for overseeing the Manager’s decisions in situations where the Manager is faced with any present or perceived conflicts of interest, all in accordance with NI 81-107.

The IRC may also approve certain mergers between the Fund and other funds and any change of the auditor of the Fund. Subject to any corporate and securities law requirements, no securityholder approval will be obtained in such circumstances, but you will be sent a written notice at least 60 days before the effective date of any such transaction or change of auditor. In certain circumstances, securityholder approval may be required to approve certain mergers.

The IRC has four members: Stephen J. Griggs (Chair), Heather A.T. Hunter, Cecilia Mo and Steven Donald each of whom is independent of the Manager.

The IRC prepares and files a report to the securityholders each fiscal year that describes the IRC and its activities for securityholders, as well as contains a complete list of the standing instructions. These standing instructions enable the Manager to act in a particular conflict of interest matter on a continuing basis provided the Manager complies with its policies and procedures established to address that conflict of interest matter and reports periodically to the IRC on the matter. This report to the securityholders is available on the Manager’s website or, at no cost, by contacting the Manager.

The compensation and other reasonable expenses of the IRC will be paid out of the assets of the Fund as well as out of the assets of the other investment funds for which the IRC may act as the independent review committee. The compensation for the IRC is an annual flat fee. Expenses of the IRC may include premiums for insurance coverage, travel expenses and reasonable out-of-pocket expenses.

The Manager is required to advise the IRC of any breach of a condition of any standing instructions. The standing instructions require, among other things, that the investment decision in respect to a related party transaction: (a) is made by the Manager free from any influence by an entity related to the Manager and without taking into account any consideration to any associate or affiliate of the Manager; (b) represents the business judgment of the Manager uninfluenced by considerations other than the best interests of the Fund; and (c) is made in compliance with the Manager’s written policies and procedures. Transactions made by the Manager under the standing instructions are subsequently reviewed by the IRC to monitor compliance.

The Manager, in respect of its management of the Fund relied on IRC standing instructions regarding related party transactions as set out below:

- Paying brokerage commissions and spreads to a related party for effecting security transactions on an principal basis on behalf of the Fund;

- Investments in the securities of issuers for which a related underwriter acted as an underwriter during the distribution of such securities and the 60-day period following the completion of such distribution;
- Purchases of securities of a related party;
- Investment Advisor Monitoring and Oversight

Management Fees

No management fee is charged in respect of units of the Fund. Investors in these units have agreed to pay a managed account fee directly to MD Financial Management Inc.

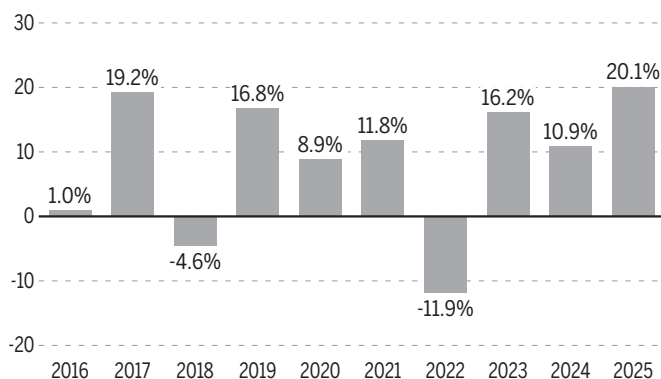
Past Performance

Management uses the MSCI EAFE Index as the benchmark for this Fund because it represents the aggregate returns of securities listed on exchanges in European, Australasian and Far Eastern markets. Although index returns are hypothetical – as they do not reflect the true cost of owning or managing the underlying stocks – they are one of several useful indicators. By comparing the

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Fund's performance to the movements of the benchmark, we are able to assess how the Fund is doing. For example, some short-term deviations can signal the need for change while others confirm the expectations of a longer-term strategy. If Management were to ascertain that the Fund's over (or under) performance was the result of excessive risk-taking or deviation from the investment mandate, we would, on behalf of all our unitholders, address these issues with the Investment Advisor and make changes if necessary.

The Fund underperformed over all noted periods. The Fund combines strategies that target both growth and value companies. For much of the past three years, including the most recent one-year period, the value strategies deployed within the Fund outperformed, however this was not enough to overcome the underperformance of the growth strategies from a benchmark relative perspective. This weakness has dragged down longer-term five- and 10-year relative returns as well. Regionally, positions in Europe had the most negative impact on relative return due to being underweight more cyclical areas like banks and defense companies, both of which surged recently. Ten-year return remain slightly behind benchmark net of fees, due to the recent period of headwinds related to the quality growth bias in the Fund.

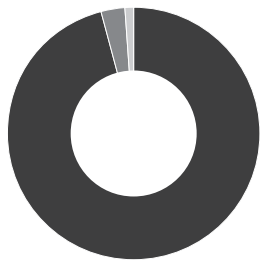

⁴ The Fund's portfolio turnover rate indicates how actively the Fund's portfolio advisor manages its portfolio investments. A portfolio turnover rate of 100% is equivalent to the Fund buying and selling all of the securities in its portfolio once in the course of the year. The higher a fund's portfolio turnover rate in a year, the greater the trading costs payable by the fund in the year, and the greater the chance of an investor receiving taxable capital gains in the year. There is not necessarily a relationship between a high turnover rate and the performance of a fund.
